Dying to know: final conversations about death

This week includes Dying to Know Day - an annual campaign where conversations about death are encouraged. As Health Professionals, conversations about death are common but uncommonly done well. This week we will explore end of life conversations.

Talking about death is ... morbid taboo weird weird

The 'final conversation about death' is:

- Unique to the individual and their experiences
- Remains somewhat 'taboo' among health professionals
- Often inconsistently done with lack of training opportunities for health professionals
- Complicated by competing priorities, lack of experience and confidence in broaching the subject of death and dying with patients
- Often left too late
